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Mini Course Line Up for Convention 2022

Join us on Sunday for a Mini Course presented to the whole convention, and then afterwards there will be three time slots that have four courses running concurrently—two in-person only, one in-person and live streamed, and one fully virtual on Zoom.

ini Courses are small group offerings for attendees (both virtual and in-person) to learn about a topic that is presented by someone from the Swedenborgian Church of North America or an invited guest. We are excited to be able to offer a variety of formats this year for our hybrid convention. Once registration for Convention has closed, you will be contacted about which Mini Course you might like to attend.

There are three formats for Mini Courses

- In-person for on campus attendees only
- Streamed live (not pre-recorded) from campus. Virtual attendees are able to view this Mini Course, but will not be able to interact with those in the room
- Fully virtual on Zoom (on campus attendees will need to log in to Zoom on their own device to participate in this course)

Three of the four time slots have four courses running concurrently—two in-person, one live streamed, and one fully virtual. Virtual attendees will be able to choose between the live streamed and fully virtual sessions, while the in-person attendees can attend any of the courses being offered. Finally, we will be offering a Mini Course called Translating at Babel: Church Leadership in the Public Square by Rev. Rich Tafel that will be live streamed in its own time slot on Sunday morning for all to attend together.

Sunday, June 26 at 10:15 AM PT (One Course for all attendees)

Translating at Babel: Church Leadership in the Public Square Rev. Rich Tafel

This course will be in-person on campus and live streamed.



This Mini Course will make the case that the most important way Christians can become peacemakers is to become "translators." We live in a culture

now that talks past and over each other. We've learned to demonize those

who disagree with us. We've sorted ourselves into bubbles of people who think like us. We use the same words with different meanings. Everyone is talking, but who is listening? This high level of polarization has reached the point where we see people with different political views not as simply wrong but evil and a threat to our life. With the anxiety in the midst of pandemics, wars, and uncertainty, many political leaders exploit our fears. This course will show that Swedenborgian leaders can play a critical role in leading as translators across cultural boundaries. Swedenborg's insights into the meaning of the Tower of Babel offer us a different take on that famous story and new insights into our Babel culture today. Our tradition's evolutionary spirituality offers us a map to understand what's going on and where things are headed, based on our theology of an inclusive and loving God who never uses fear and shame to guide us. The course will give case study examples of what we can do as individuals, churches, and as parts of larger communities seeking to be peacemakers in these times of great division.

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Editor's Corner



Love is Love

Much of this issue of the Messenger is dedicated to the proposed standing resolution Welcome and Support of All People in the

LGBTQ+ Community (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Plus*) being brought to the floor of convention this year in Long Beach. (You can find the full wording of this proposal on p. 64.) I have always been proud of our church's stance on ordaining women and those who are in the LGBTQ+ community. I would like to share two stories of mine, one more recent than the other, of when I have felt most proud of our stance on LGBTQ+ issues.

When I was in high school, I had a solid group of friends—many of us had been friends since preschool. We hung out regularly, and one of our friends had an amazing basement to hang out in, and we spent many weekend nights there. Many of them came

from Christian upbringings, but at the time, I wasn't fully aware of differences in beliefs, so it didn't matter much to me. It goes without saying, and I'm sure many of you will find it shocking, that my brother and I were the only Swedenborgians in our high school.

One of these nights in the late 90s, my junior year, I clearly remember sitting around the table in my friend's kitchen, and we were talking about relationships. I don't recall how, but same-sex relationships came up. One of my guy friends got very worked up and said, "I don't care what anyone says, God created a man and a woman to fit together, everything else is wrong!" I was so caught off guard I didn't know how to respond. This was someone who I considered a close friend, and I had no idea they felt this way. What about my family members who were gay or lesbian? I have never felt nor been taught that they are "wrong" in the eyes of God. There were a few others around the table that agreed with him. I did not get angry, but said that I, and my church, don't feel that way, got up, and went to play bumper pool in the basement with some others.

After this gathering, I realized that I didn't feel as close to these particular friends as I once assumed I was. While I had no ill will towards them, I knew our views on spirituality and love simply didn't align—I eventually distanced myself from this group over time. At the time, I didn't have enough knowledge of other religions or the intellectual tools to defend my perspective to these different views, and we drifted apart naturally. Some I have remained in contact with over social media and their views have evolved over time. This was one of the first times that I realized how special our church is, and that I was proud to be a part of it.

Fast forward twenty-something years to last summer, 2021. Rev. Jane had sent out a letter at the beginning

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of June—Pride Month—encouraging the ministries to simply hang a Pride Flag in their church as a way to show welcoming to the LGBTQ+ community. As part of the leadership team of the Fryeburg New Church Assembly, a couple of us brought this idea back to the Board of Directors. The Board then decided to bring a motion to the membership at their annual meeting to hang the Pride flag on our flagpole under the American Flag. We went into this meeting knowing there would be some people who wouldn't be thrilled with the idea. One of the things the

The Year of Providence: 2021-22



Dear Friends,

I am honored to bring before you this proposed standing resolution to be presented at our Annual Convention 2022 for your vote. It was written by the Social Justice Committee at the suggestion of the LGBTQ+ Focus Group. Rev. Dr. Jonathan Mitchell wrote the first draft, and it received several renditions and modifications from both committees. It truly represents the voice of the committee members.

The resolution to be LGBTQ+ Embracing is on behalf of our denomination. Each of our churches and camps will have the opportunity to decide if they want to become LGBTQ+ Embracing ministries. Plans are underway to provide education for those ministries that request more information on how to be welcoming, inclusive, and pastoral for people in the LGBTQ+ community.

This is an important step for our denomination to reach out in love and acceptance in a time of prejudice, discrimination, and condemnation by some religious institutions. We have always stood by our Christian inclusivity and now we have another chance to show it. We have Standing Resolution 3 on inclusion (1960, 1989, 2015), Standing Resolution 14 on discrimination (2019), and the COM Statement on Same Sex Marriage (2004). May this Standing Resolution in support of the LGBTQ+ community (2022) link hands with the others to strengthen our resolve and further our actions.

A Forty-Year Journey Engaging Human Sexuality and Gender Questions in the Swedenborgian Church of North America

t the upcoming annual convention, a proposed Standing Resolution of welcome and support of all people in the LGBTQ+community will be brought to the floor. Our Church has striven to understand and address the emerging and changing world of sexuality and gender identities that has profoundly characterized our times. I would like to lift up the theological and spiritual reflection that has occurred, in official and published ways, over the past several decades.

1979: Council of Ministers Statement on "The Conjugial Principle and Human Sexuality"

In the late 1970s, an openly gay ordinand—a fourth-generation Swedenborgian named Paul Giunta, raised in and an active member of the Cambridge Church—was admitted to the Swedenborg School of Religion but with no promise that ordination would be available, since the specific question had never been faced. To inform the journey, the Council of Ministers shaped a year-long study of relevant theological, biblical, and spiritual questions raised by evolving public journeys with sexual orientation. That ad hoc study committee was chaired by the professor of pastoral care and counseling, Rev. Dr. Calvin E. Turley, who was joined by Rev. Dr. Dorothea Harvey, Rev. Dr. George Dole, Rev. Randy Laakko, and Rev. Richard H. Tafel, Jr. Their report to the Council of Ministers in 1978 was reworked by Rev. Cal Turley into a further position paper, "The Conjugial Principle and Human Sexuality" the following year

that was widely shared in the church. As circumstances unfolded, Paul Giunta lost his life in a violent attack days before the convention in 1980 when he was to come up for an ordination vote. Though that vote and ultimate conversation was thwarted at that time, an important exploration of meaning and purpose for the changes occurring in public awareness around human sexuality had begun with careful thought.

Rev. Cal Turley's widely read position paper emphasizes the limitations of regarding sexuality as only for the purpose of procreation and argues instead "the central emphasis must be on nurturing human souls," which can take a variety of healthy and spiritually nourishing forms. The eleven-page, single-spaced paper concludes with these words:

The conjugial principle of dynamic, creative interrelatedness and relationship is not limited to anyone, single definition or expression of commitment between persons. It is not limited in its expression to any one specifically defined means of genital relating; nor is it limited to any one specific purpose of procreation. Rather, the Divine Conjugial is a symbol of the very essence of life, the unitive process which can and does manifest itself in a multitude of varieties which we can only dimly perceive and before which we stand in humble awe.

1986: Resolution on Whom We Ordain

It is important to remember that 1975 was the year the first woman became ordained in any branch of Swedenborgianism in the world, and though there was no vote in 1980 on a popular, skillful, and openly gay candidate, the Council of Ministers continued to encourage discussions on the right foundations for ordination. Increasingly, broad agreement developed for the position that the qualities for ordination are internal qualities and are not affected positively or negatively on external sociological factors. In a resolution, whose primary author was Rev. Dr. George Dole, a foundational statement was endorsed at the 1986 convention. Here's the pivotal language:

Periodically during its history, Convention has faced issues of suitability for ministry. It has dealt with questions of social class, race, divorce, and gender, as it currently faces the issues of sexual orientation and may in future years face questions presently unseen. Its decisions have in each case affirmed a consistent principle, which the Council of Ministers expresses as follows:

"In light of the inclusiveness of the vision of the Holy City, New Jerusalem, from which our theological perspective is drawn, the Council of Ministers believes that the central consideration in evaluating requests for ordination is the quality of the ministry that it believes the individual is capable of providing."

In other words, in the Swedenborgian Church of North America, we assess inner qualities of training and readiness for excellent service as the relevant considerations—the Church does not regard external and social aspects of personal definition to be relevant considerations.

1997: First Vote on an Openly Gay **Candidate for Ordination**

In 1993, a lifelong member of Convention who grew up in the Elmwood Church, Jonathan Mitchell, was accepted into the ministry program at the Swedenborg School of Religion. The support for those identifying homosexual seemed strong by then in the Church, and no significant resistance appeared. That probably explains why no formal denominational statements were shaped. The editor of Studia Swedenborgiana, Rev. Dr. Bill Woofenden, commissioned two ministers to publish articles looking at theological dimensions of gender and sexuality, which led to "The Role of Gender in Marriage: A Swedenborgian View" by Rev. Carl E. Yenetchi and "The Spiritual Origin of Sexuality and Gender," by Rev. John K. Billings. The editor of the Messenger, Patte LeVan, commissioned what became a twopart article by me, Rev. Dr. Jim Lawrence, "Risking on the Side of Compassion" and "Further Thoughts on the Gay Marriage Commentary" spurred by the vigorous response to the first article. The ordination vote on Jonathan Mitchell passed overwhelmingly in both the Council of Ministers and on the floor of convention, and there have been several subsequent ordinations of openly gay candidates since.

2004: Denominational Statement on Same-Sex Marriage

With the rise of social and political discourse and action in the arena of legalizing same-sex marriages, in 2003 the Church of the Good Shepherd in Kitchener, Ontario, asked the Council of Ministers for guidance on whether to support same-sex marriage ceremonies in their church. In response, the Council of Ministers appointed Rev. Paul Zacharias, Rev. Dr.

Jonathan Mitchell, Rev. Kit Billings, and Rev. Kim Hinrichs (as chair) to serve as a task force to study relevant issues and questions and come back the following year with a report and possible recommendation(s). This process led to a formal "Denominational Statement on Same-Sex Marriage," adopted at the 2004 annual convention. This statement was fundamentally supportive spiritually and politically of legalizing same-sex marriages and of celebrating same-sex marriages in Swedenborgian churches. However, it also affirmed the congregational polity of the denomination and affirmed the right of all congregations to make their own final decisions on whether to hold same-sex marriage ceremonies in their own churches.

2022: Proposal for a Standing **Resolution of Welcome and** Support of All People in the LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Plus) **Community**

In the nearly two decades since the statement on same-sex marriage, the issues of gender identity and sexuality have continued to grow in significance in cultural discourse around not only social justice issues but also in spirituality studies. The awareness level in our contemporary moment is much higher than two decades ago, and many people exploring spiritual programs and movements often look explicitly for information on where a particular denomination stands. This is especially true of the younger generations. For this reason, the need for a formal public relations statement has grown for many in the Swedenborgian Church of North America, and we will have a chance to discuss the resolution that has been shaped not only by the Social Justice Committee but with the help of several others, including me. I am in support of this proposed resolution both because of its message and of its usefulness for describing a broadly held commitment throughout our denomination and communicating such to those asking the question.

Tuesday, June 28 at 9:30 AM PT (Four Options)

Church Strategies to Reach People: Lessons Learned from the Art of Reaching Course Told from Four Perspectives

Rev. Rich Tafel, Rev. Shada Sullivan, Pastor Robbin Ferriman, and Pastor Paul Deming

This course will be in-person on campus and live streamed.

Last summer, an article by a Canadian evangelical pastor predicted that the church would never be the same after the pandemic. The insights from this piece were circulated to all clergy. A group of ministers wanted to know what more can we learn from the successful practices of other faith paths. Our denomination agreed to cover the cost for ministers willing to take the course, but also to provide a bi-weekly Swedenborgian translation of those growth efforts. Four pastors agreed to take the class and create their own working group. In this course, four congregational leaders will share their takeaways from the course and offer



ideas for how we can grow in these turbulent times.

The Great Day of the Lord: Swedenborgian Millenarianism after 1757

Dell J. Rose

This course will be fully on Zoom and available to everyone anywhere.

In 1757, Swedenborg had a vision



of the last judgment, and his New Age was far from the brimstone and blood of the Christian Millenarianism. However, this vision as well as

Swedenborg's ambiguity toward apocalypticism did not stop his earliest followers from engaging in millenarian discourse and speculation about the end of all things and "the coming of the Lord." The beginning of the nineteenth century was a period of marked millenarian expectation, and though it was perhaps not Swedenborg's intention, there were several prominent apocalyptic thinkers deeply influenced by Swedenborg's thought. This workshop will provide an introduction to the world of nineteenth century millenarianism in its British context and highlight the role that Swedenborg's teachings played in popular imaginings of "the end." This course is introductory and assumes no prior exposure to the material, and it is especially recommended for those interested in Swedenborgian cultural history.

Dell J. Rose is an American Ph.D. student at the University of Amsterdam. Holding a bachelor's degree with majors in English, History, and Religion and a master's degree in Folklore, he is also a fellow of the Swedenborg Society in London. His doctoral project deals with the early reception of Swedenborg's ideas amongst nineteenth-century reforming societies and in nineteenth-century political discourse. Further academic interests include Christian theosophy (especially Caspar Schwenckfeld, whom Swedenborg mentions, and Jakob Böhme, to whom Swedenborg was often compared by his contemporaries), Willem Bilderdijk studies, Sabbateanism, and the work of Franz von Baader.

A New Church Year of Jubilee Rev. Sage Cole

This course will be in-person on campus. On March 3, 2022, the communi-



ty at Swedenborg Chapel in Cambridge, Massachusetts, declared a New Church Jubilee Year, with the intention of taking a full year not to jump back

to what once felt like normalcy, but instead intentionally to stay in the uncertainty generated by the pandemic and consider how we are being called to change and grow to become more of the New Church that Swedenborg declared. We declared this year on March 3rd, as that was the day in 1887 when Helen Keller met her teacher Annie Sullivan and the day she would always celebrate as her "Spiritual Birthday." Helen Keller has been Swedenborg Chapel's resident Swedenborgian saint since 2018 when we first declared our dream to build a center in her honor on our site. In this Mini Course, Rev. Sage will share stories from this New Church Jubilee Year, possibilities that have emerged, and insights from Helen Keller's writings and life.

Black Church History in Convention (and more) Sue Ditmire

This course will be in-person on campus.

This Mini Course will share something of the emerging story on Convention's own "Black Church" history as it emerges with several key figures and valued neighborhood churches in Boston, Manhattan, and other places. Additionally, we will dive into how to be a church historian and offer tips and insights for discovering the history of your church or association or perhaps another story line that interests you.



Sue (Weiss) Ditmire first joined a Swedenborgian church at Kemper Road Center (Cincinnati) in 1973 and served as the secretary for the denominational Board of Education for three years in the 1980s. She moved to southern New Jersey in 1983 and joined the Wilmington, Delaware, congregation. She holds a degree in accounting and ran Ditmire Motorworks with her husband for many years until turning it over to her children. Now retired, she dedicates her time to historic research and is currently working on Convention history from numerous angles and is available to assist people and congregations with history questions.

Feminine Swedenborgian Spirituality

Rev. Roslyn Taylor

This course will be in-person on campus and live streamed.

This Mini Course offers an overview of female spirituality, with a look at the relevant Swedenborgian teachings. Participants will explore together how the themes of female Swedenborgian spirituality are emerging in the activities of the Deborah's Tree ministry.

Swedenborgian Church of North America, living in Bryn Athyn, Pennsylvania. She facilitates the Home Church in Bryn Athyn, recently founded the Deborah's Tree ministry, and has



provided music for worship services in several different contexts.

Three Essentials of Church Governance: What Pastors and Leaders Need to Know

This course will be fully on Zoom and available to everyone anywhere.

Church governance is often overlooked when things are going along well. It is only when a church faces conflict or crisis that the documents are pulled out and all too often are found wanting. Reviewing them for key elements when things are going well is a gift to the church if crisis befalls it. This course will look at best practices of key areas of church governance documents, parliamentary procedures, and liability issues. Based on work by Richard Hammer of Church Law and Tax, Kevin Baxter will highlight some crucial areas that are important for ministers, pastors, and church leaders to be aware of.

Rev. Kevin Baxter is the senior pastor of Church on the Hill, Boston, Massachusetts—an independent Swedenborgian Church. He has also served as Chair of the Council of Ministers,



co-editor of *Our Daily Bread*, pastor at Swedenborg Chapel in Cambridge, and as an administrator and instructor at Urbana University.

The Life of Religion: The Challenge of Doing Good

Swedenborgians to engage civic life. In this Mini Course, we will offer a summary of the content of this series, highlight key findings, and provide ample time for discussion and questions on this topic of growing import for our church.


ayfarers Chapel, the National Memorial to Emanuel Swedenborg, owned and governed by The Swedenborgian Church, will be one of the sites toured by Annual Convention attendees Monday afternoon, June 27, 2022.

The very unique circumstances that brought about the gift of the land, long before the inspired design and building of this treasure, marks the beginning of a very rich and profound history. Wayfarers has welcomed hundreds of thousands of wayfaring sojourners since 1951, making their way to this iconic structure that represents something far greater than its unique beauty. Wayfarers Chapel promotes a spiritual and rational approach to a life of faith, welcoming diversity and inclusion. We are all on a journey

that continues to evolve and the God we embrace and reflect is a God that *IS* Love and is the very source of Wisdom.

As we arrive on June 27, Monday afternoon, there will be members of our Board of Directors providing tours of the "Tree Chapel," nestled in Redwood Pines overlooking the sprawling front lawn adorned by thirty-foot Stone Pines and breathtaking views of the Pacific Ocean. You will pass the Reflection Pool along the walkway to the Chapel that isn't always immediately identified by first time visitors since most of what you see from a distance are the Redwoods and blue-sky glistening between the trees through the large

glass panes of the Chapel. You will be moved experiencing the serenity and peaceful calm inside Wayfarers Chapel as you take time to reflect on the external beauty that harmonizes with its natural surroundings. This promotes an inward examination that fos-

To the rear of the Chapel is the Cornerstone placed in 1949 near the loggia and the tower that are visible as you approach the three and a half acre site. Additional areas of interest will be the aromatic rose garden surrounded by the Walk of Honor that celebrates many of the wedding ceremonies held on site, as well as memorials and baptisms with names and dates on the brick walkway. Steps away, as you walk down the colonnade to the Amphitheater, you will see the area that has hosted Easter Sunrise services through the

years with more breathtaking views of the Pacific Ocean. Among the several additional events held at the Amphitheater site are: local artists, Off The Left Eye gatherings and receptions (the next is scheduled for July 3, 2022 Sunday afternoon), and art fairs. As you

pass the meditation garden and hillside stream to the Visitors Center and Giftshop, be sure and pick up a treasure that will often remind you of your wayfaring journey to the iconic Chapel that promotes the healing of humanity through spiritual consciousness, Love for all, and Wisdom that makes our journey worth every moment of inconvenience and challenge.

Following the tour, we will all enjoy a Mexican feast with barbacoa chicken-pastor, enchiladas, mini chicken flautas, rice and beans, assorted toppings

of guacamole, sour cream, pico with chips and salsa, soft drinks, with cupcakes and cookies for the finale.

We will then be moving into the Chapel for the evening Ordination Service that will surely be the crescendo to a day of beauty and soul restoration. If you are unable to attend in person, this service will be live streamed.

We look forward with great anticipation to sharing the day with you at Wayfarers Chapel.

Church of the Holy City in Washington, D.C. Begins Tower Restoration

hurch of the Holy City in Washington, D.C. is a land-mark in our nation's capital located on Sixteenth Street only a ten-minute walk away from the White House. Possibly the most striking part of the church's architecture is that incredible tower with far reaching pinnacles.

The church, built in 1896, was designed by a leading architect in the United States, Langford Warren, the dean of Harvard's School of Architecture. He was joined by another famous Swedenborgian architect, Paul Pelz, who would go on to design the Library of Congress.

Their masterpiece is stunning from the outside, but now over one hundred years old, it has been in need of major renovations. Together with the General Council, the Trustees, and the Building Fund we worked in coordination with the leadership at Church of the Holy City to engage in a four-year program to make the building safe for use.


The biggest challenge for the team seeking to keep the church safe has been tackling the church tower. One hundred years of weather, snow, hurricanes, and one earthquake have left the tower in a vulnerable position.

Minutes from church meetings in the 1980s record concerns that the tower needs to be inspected and repaired. The local church and trustees have been looking for financially responsible ways to tackle the challenge.

History repeated itself when a prominent Cambridge, Massachusetts, architect Mark Careaga—a member of the Cambridge Church—in a meeting with our church President, Jane Siebert, and Treasurer Jennifer

Lindsay, offered to help find the right team to begin work on the tower. Based on this guidance, on March 8, 2022, the tower began much needed repairs. For the first time in church history the building has been seen from above when cranes were used to view the structural decay.

In addition to getting the first real view of the tower from



above, a masonry team inspected every pinnacle to see if any were in danger of potentially

falling off. After two days of work over ten pieces of pinnacle were removed from the tower, each a foot to two feet long. The team working on the project said it was only a matter of time before these would have fallen to the ground. In addition, the team cemented a loose piece that was too large to remove.

The project was conducted with

three female leaders—from the masonry team, the engineering team and our own Shalonda Ingram—on the International Day of Wom-

en. Thanks to this proactive work, the church is no longer a potential threat to pedestrians nearby.

As if to acknowledge this important work, a new book was published last week entitled, Sixteenth Street,

Washington's Avenue of Ambition. This was followed by a Washington Post article that highlighted the book. The book interviews church members Malcolm Peck and Elfa Halloway.

We face daunting challenges in our world and in our churches, but working together we can find ways to move forward together.


Led by our hosting congregations, our opening worship service will introduce our Convention theme *The Tree of Life: Into the Garden* and center us in the Lord.

What I didn't expect was the amount of Swedenborgian doctrine that was used to try to prove LGBTQ+ lifestyles invalid. One of our board members who identifies with the LBGTQ+ community got up in front of the whole membership and presented the motion to the group. Most of the members that had any concerns were about hanging the flags (US and Pride Progress) together-many just felt that any flag, apart from a state flag, hung with the US flag was disrespectful to our country. That is not something I personally would have ever thought of and was an reasonable compromise to make. But the use of Swedenborg's words against this, while someone who identifies with this group is standing at the front of the meeting, fighting back tears, was not something I was prepared for. One of our Board members finally reminded the group that while we want and love having members from other churches with us, we are a Convention affiliated organization, and our beliefs align with theirs.


This discussion went on for almost an hour when the motion got amended to not hang the flag with the American flag, but in a location that was visible from the road and from the front porch of our Main Building. We settled on the corner of Chalmers Lodge, our teen rec hall.



he Swedenborgian Church of North America (SCNA) publicly declares itself to be LGBTQ+ Embracing. The SCNA encourages all its constituent bodies to become LGBTQ+ Embracing.

As an LGBTQ+ Embracing organization, the SCNA recognizes that the LGBTQ+ community, in particular those of color, continue to experience prejudice, discrimination, and condemnation at the hands of many religious institutions. The SCNA will clearly and publicly make known their welcome of all LGBTQ+ people, will advocate in the public sphere for their rights, and will educate themselves on the care and pastoring of people in the LGBTQ+ community. We welcome LGBTQ+ seekers and support their identities and loving relationships. All rites and sacraments of the SCNA are available to LGBTQ+ people including, baptism, confirmation, communion, marriage, consecration as a licensed pastor, ordination, and services of remembrance.

The SCNA understands the message of love and inclusion taught to us through the Bible and insights of Emanuel Swedenborg to affirm diversity in all its exciting complexity, offering equal value and worth to all people with a variety of God given gender identities, gender expressions, sexual orientations, and loving relationships. The SCNA will not interpret the Bible or the writings of Emanuel Swedenborg in ways that deny the equal value and worth of all sexual orientations, genders, gender identities, and gender expressions. We will support everyone who is engaged in the regenerative journey-individual or partnered. We



affirm any partnered relationships that are entered into freely, are grounded in mutual fidelity and respect, and have as their end the well-being and spiritual growth of each partner. We acknowledge that living in truly loving and wise ways is possible for finite and fallible human beings only with the Lord's leading.

As our understanding of this continues to unfold, the SCNA is dedicated to educating itself and others. The SCNA respects the judgment of those who make decisions for its constituent bodies and lends its support to them as they discern whether to become LGBTQ+ Embracing and will offer resources and guidance to facilitate the process.
